## Brexit: will work permits be required for British citizens?

From 1 January 2021, the rules will change for employers wishing to hire British employees in Belgium, with a distinction being made between British citizens who already live in Belgium and those who arrive in the country after 31 December 2020.

## British employees living in Belgium before 2021

For British citizens already residing in Belgium before 1 January 2021, no action needs to be taken, as they currently hold an E or E+ card. However, the Immigration Office will contact them in 2021 to issue them with another residence permit – an M card – which will enable them to work in Belgium without their employer having to apply for a single permit from the region in question. However, employers will have to request a copy of their British employees' residence documents and keep them on file, as British employees will become third-country nationals under the new arrangement.

## British employees arriving in Belgium after 2020

British citizens travelling to Belgium for a maximum period of 90 days will be exempt from visa requirements. However, their employer will have to apply for a work permit from the competent region. The region to which an application for a work permit must be submitted shall be determined by the place of employment. Current exemptions for work permits (such as meetings with limited numbers or a training course) shall continue to apply to British employees.

However, if a British citizen comes to live and work in Belgium for more than 90 days, their employer will have to apply for a single permit. The single permit includes access to the territory governed by the federal state and permission to work (granted by the region). However, an application for a single permit only needs to be submitted to the competent region, which is determined based on the place of employment.

## Trainees

In the future, it will be far more complicated to hire a British trainee under a professional integration agreement (Convention d'immersion professionnelle). In all other cases except for trainees residing in Belgium before 1 January 2021, employers must apply for a work permit (maximum stay of 90 days) or a single permit (stay of more than 90 days).
